WHAT IS A POLICY?

How do you know if a source is a policy document?

- Formal document
- Rules are binding
- Usually published by a public or government organisation
- May set out purpose, definitions, scope, responsibilities, methods or behaviours
- Strategy, planning, standards, requirements, code of conduct and agreement documents MAY be policy documents in disguise or overlap with much of the content.



FOLLOW THESE STEPS TO START A POLICY ASSESSMENT

- Step One: Understanding the assessment question
- Step Two: Narrow the scope of the paper according to the marking criteria.
- Step Three: find the/a current policy on the issue and responses to the policy.
- Step Four: Research the issue and identify sources to use to evidence or support your writing
- Step Five: Develop a scaffold into heading sections for your paper.
- Step six: Write your first draft
- Step Seven: Edit and proofread.





STEP ONE: UNDERSTANDING YOUR ASSESSMENT QUESTION

In a policy analysis assessment, you may be required to ...

- identify a social issue
- critically analyse a policy that responds to an issue.
- **compare** different policies and decide which is the most effective.
- **compare** different political parties, and their policies on a particular issue.

STEP TWO: NARROW THE SCOPE

According to the assessment question and marking criteria, you may need to

- Choose a specific principle, such as poverty, inequality, social cohesion, social inclusion
- Choose a sub-area of the broad area
- Choose a specific geographical area
- Choose a specific level of government: Commonwealth, State, Local
- Choose a particular population group





STEP TWO: NARROW THE SCOPE

SWSP6143: Public Policy and Civil Society Assessment 2

Assessment Details and Instructions

You are to write a report that compares two different 'policy approaches' to a contemporary social issue.

e.g. Drug policy that takes a harm minimisation approach versus Drug policy that takes an abstinence approach



STEP THREE: FIND THE CURRENT POLICY ON THE ISSUE

To find current policies and responses to policies, you should.

- check you class lecture/tutorial notes
- check Library Pathfinder
- check organisation websites which relate to group/issue at hand
- do a plain old Google Scholar or Google search for the key words in the question plus 'policy'
- use the 'Ask the library' chat box





STEP FOUR: RESEARCH THE ISSUE (BACKGROUNDING)

Questions:

- What is the issue?
- How does it present?
- What are causes and conditions of the issue?
- Who is affected by the issue?
- Why is the issue a problem?
- What are the relevant policies?

You may need:

- Knowledge of the relevant services and organisations.
- Responses from the relevant stakeholders.
- Knowledge of the issues identified by others.
- History of developments and debates.
- Knowledge about significant concepts in social justice debates, e.g., poverty, inequality, social citizenship







Provide a clear, concise and engaging **account** of:

- the issues under consideration
- the scope and dimensions of the issue
- the current policy situation
- the **impact** of policies on individuals, groups and communities
- recommendations for action



STEP SIX: WRITE YOUR FIRST DRAFT



Structured body paragraph formula

Topic sentence: State the main idea

Evidence 1: Support the main idea with academic reference 1

Elaborate/Explain: Connect reference 1 to the main idea

Evidence 2: Insert reference 2 to support or contrast with reference 1

Analysis: Critically analyse the main idea synthesizing reference 1 and 2

Concluding sentence / Link: Conclude and connect to next paragraph

Note: The arrows indicate that the order can switch.

Empowering Indigenous Communities to Prevent Child Abuse and Neglect

For many Indigenous families, the fear and distrust of family services has significant impacts on parenting, safety for children, and opportunities to receive help. According to Blacklock (2014), this sense of distrust stems from the past policies of removing children, which have had a profound and enduring effect on the emotional and social well-being of generations of Aboriginal people. In recognition of this harm and suffering, Aboriginal community leaders developed the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Child Placement Principle in the 1980s (SNAICC, 2013). This document upholds the rights of the child's family and community to have some control and influence over decisions about their children. It also prioritises options that should be explored when an Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander child is placed in care. The document has been adopted in legislation or policy in all Australian states and territories. However, recent reviews estimate it has been fully applied in only 15% of child protection cases involving Aboriginal children (Australian Centre for Child Protection [ACCP], 2013). Research has shown that where families have greater involvement in decision making in child protection, there is greater trust and less adversarial relationships between families and child protection services (Berzin et al., 2008; Rodgers & Cahn, 2010). As a result, more concerted efforts to apply the principle can lead to better welfare outcomes for Aboriginal children.

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

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

STEP SEVEN: EDIT AND PROOFREAD

- Leave time to edit and proofread your assessment!
- Proofread for spelling, grammar and punctuation.
- Check presentation requirements specified in the unit outline.
- Check your in-text references and reference list.
- Upload your assessment to Turnitin & check the Turnitin report.
- Use Smarthinking where available!
- If in your first two trimesters, get draft feedback from SLS.
- Write your final draft and submit.





COMMON FEEDBACK COMMENTS ON ERRORS

Academic integrity-plagiarism i.e., Lack of citation, citing incorrectly

Use of informal language

Using a personal opinion instead of impersonal point of view.

Not enough critical analysis of the policy, with little focus on strengths and limitations

Too many ideas in one paragraph.

Including new ideas in conclusion section

Paraphrase source information! Use the ACAP Library APA7 Guide!

Proofread & Use grammar & spell checker!

Use the marking criteria as a checklist!

Follow the Introduction, TEEL paragraph and conclusion formulas!
